On February 3, 2025 two members of the charity began a journey to visit the artisans, staff, supporters and friends in the Tanzanian Lake Zone. Frequent readers of The Anvil will remember that we send a team to visit every year. This year we were joined by Adrian Hatch of Workaid, a charity with a very similar goal and one we hope will make an excellent partner.

Vesta Zachari

Vesta is 21 years old and has seven siblings. Both her parents have died, leaving her an orphan. Together with her siblings she lives with an Aunty. She dropped out of secondary school without any grades and soon realised that she needed to take control of her life and find employment.



Her Aunty persuaded her to apply to Hakizetu and to train as a tailor, at first she wasn't sure but she soon developed a passion and real natural ability in using a sewing machine and designing clothes. She joined the programme in July 2024 and has already completed her practical work experience training with a local tailor.



Rather than Hakizetu placing her with a local company after graduation, she has a determination to establish her own business with two of her friends and fellow trainees. Therefore, subject to satisfactorily completing the training, the group will be given two machines and some funds to cover the first few months of renting a small workshop.

We will endeavour to follow up on our next visit next year to visit her and her two friends to see how their business is doing.

We asked her where she would like to see herself in five years, she was very clear that she wants her own successful business and she wants to train other girls in tailoring and design. In her own words "I want to be a great teacher". Locally:

We will also have info about the local events we attend this year with lots of pictures of our volunteers here in Wales. We've already attended some events, The Hereford Seed Swap and the Monmouth Seed swap were very successful events in February.
